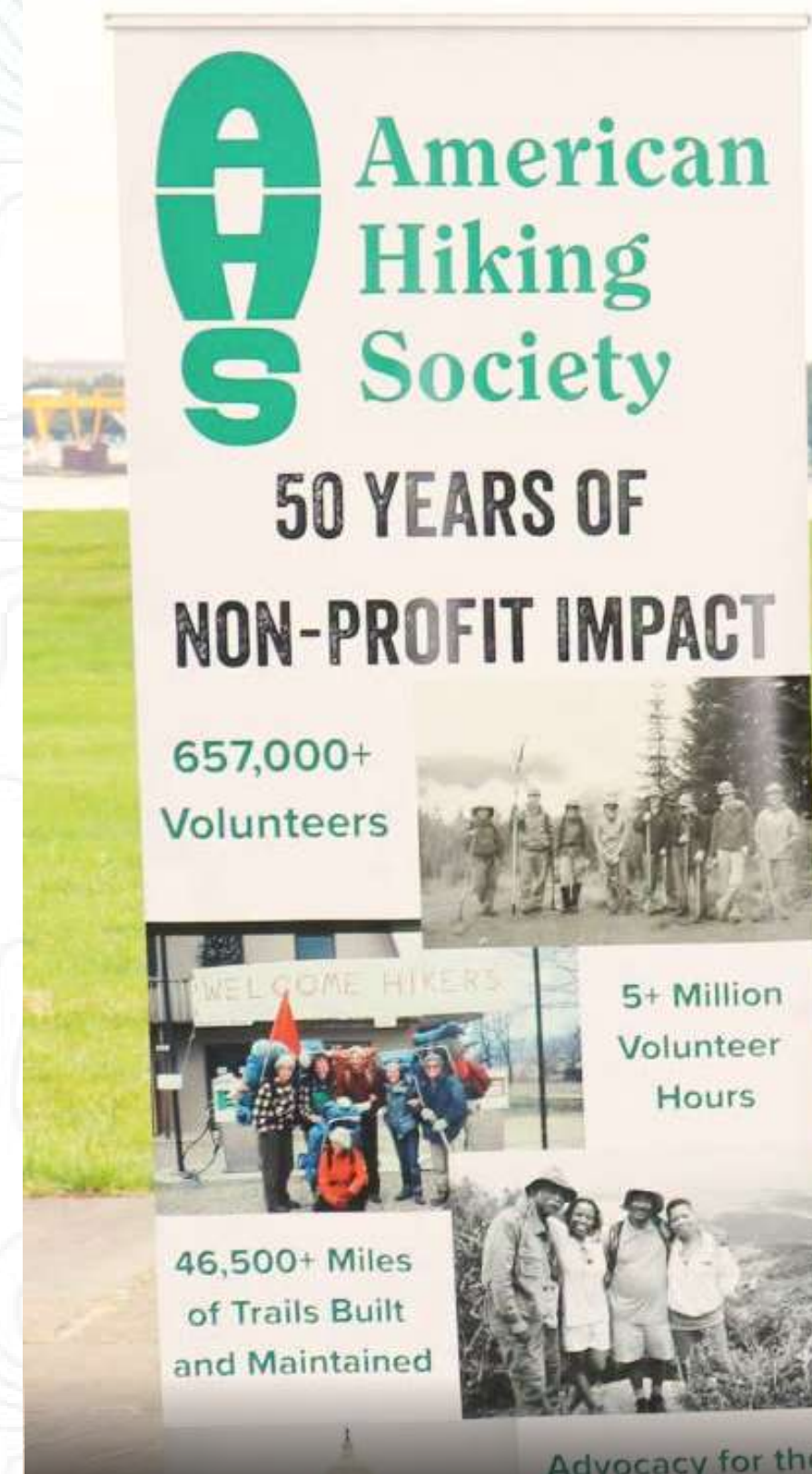

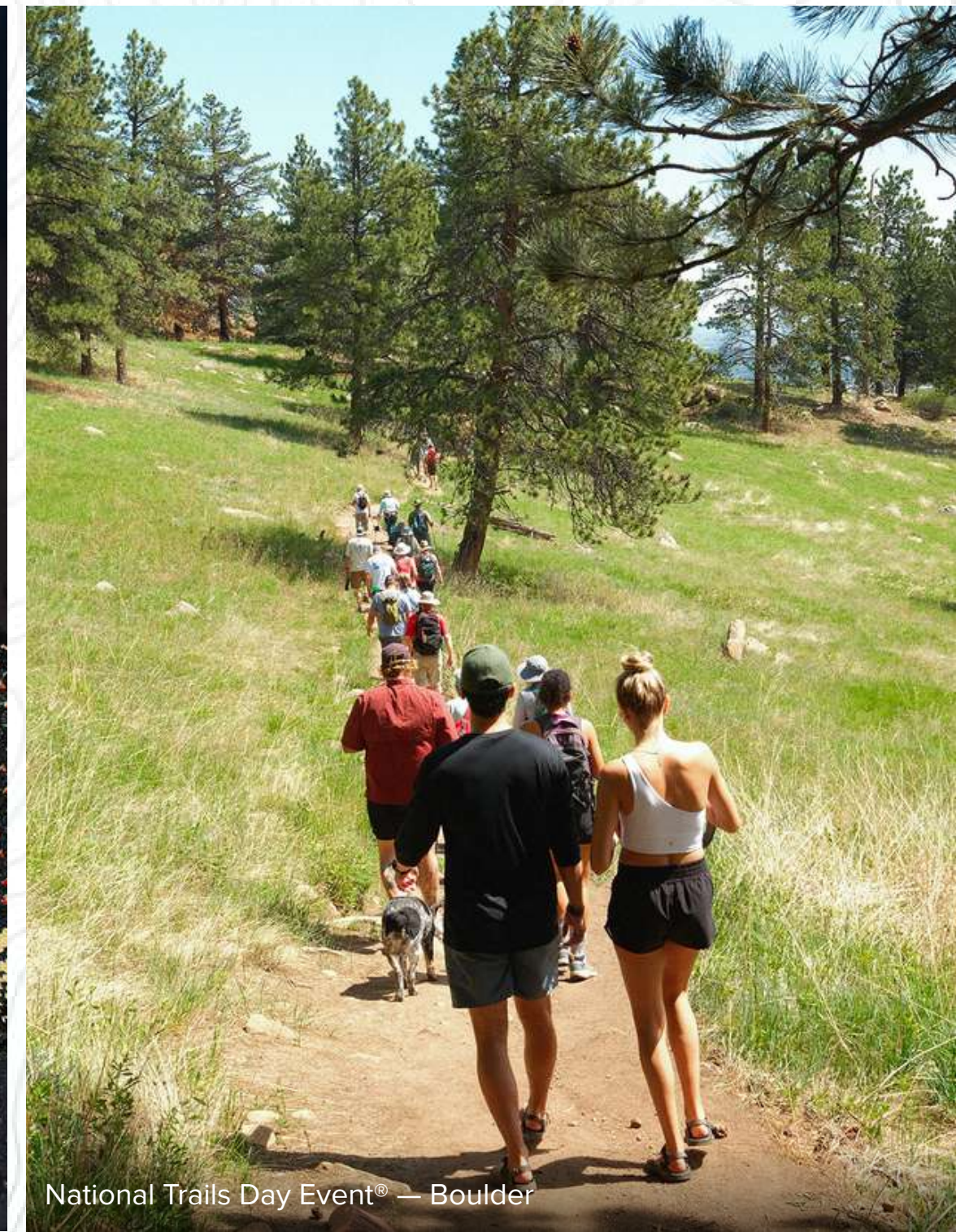

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY® 2026 MICRO-GRANT RECIPIENTS



WHAT IS THE NATIONAL TRAILS DAY® MICRO-GRANT PROGRAM?

American Hiking Society's micro-grant program is designed to expand access for those who seek to participate in meaningful events in celebration of National Trails Day®.

This year, American Hiking selected four groups to receive \$1,500 in funding for their in-person National Trails Day® festivities, each of whom are organized by and for identities that have faced barriers to outdoor recreation, leadership, and stewardship:

- The Town of Lisbon, Maine
- Native Women of Albuquerque
- Destination Hike
- Brown People Camping

With their grants, each group was encouraged to host events featuring outdoor recreation opportunities and trail service projects. Overall, our recipients used their funding towards transportation costs, hands-on materials, stewardship supplies, food and beverages, event promotion, and any other materials they needed for to create an accessible trail experience.

We are honored to work alongside each of these incredible organizations.

BROWN PEOPLE CAMPING

For National Trails Day®, Brown People Camping celebrated their 10th anniversary with a special event centered on community-building, Native history, and land acknowledgment. The group met at Rock Creek Park in Washington, D.C.

More than 28 participants joined the event, comprising of a vast range of Intersectional identities — including women and LGBTQIA+ community members! Together, attendees enjoyed a scenic hike, a prize giveaway, delicious food, and a family-friendly environment.

After the event, Brown People Camping's founder, Ambreen Tariq, shared, "For many, solitude in nature is healing; for me, finding community in the outdoors fills my soul." Needless to say, the National Trails Day® event accomplished both.



TOWN OF LISBON

Community members from Lisbon, Maine came together on National Trails Day® to create a more inclusive outdoor experience for neurodivergent individuals and their families.

Designed with accessibility and sensory needs in mind, the event offered a special hike in a low-stimulation environment where participants could explore nature at their own pace. Along the trail there were sensory exploration stations featuring natural elements like moss, stones, and bark, as well as scavenger hunts and guided activities, to encourage attendees to engage with the outdoors in a way that felt most comfortable.

Lisbon's National Trails Day® demonstrates that time outside can look different for everyone, and that's something worth celebrating!

Native Women Run Albuquerque

NATIVE WOMEN RUN ALBUQUERQUE

Native Women Run Albuquerque hosted their first National Trails Day® to further connect with, and empower, Indigenous women living in the Greater Albuquerque area.

The group met early at Willow Creek Trailhead to run, collect trash, and commune over delicious breakfast burritos. To the group's surprise, 36 people attended the event, from age 3 to senior. Notably, the group shared the day with a member of the US Forest Service, who learned about the event while working along the Continental Divide Trail!

The event organizer shared, "we adopted a mantra for the day, 'not my trash, but it's my planet.' With that mantra, everyone left with a trash bag and a pair of gloves that they could use during the week to pick up trash in another place close to their homes."



Destination Hike

DESTINATION HIKE

Destination Hike is a Washington, D.C.-based organization that seeks to bring American hikers to unforgettable natural experiences. The woman-led group offers local, national, and international adventures, and recently completed a trip across Andorra, Spain, and France.

The Destination Hike National Trails Day® event was held at Prince William Forest Park in Triangle, Virginia. In total, 30 attendees of all ages joined the "Sisterhood on the Trail" hike, including an incredible group of women of color (ages 30–60)! Along their 4-mile trek, the group built community and collected trash.

Reflecting on the event, the group said, "The weather perfect, the energy was unmatched, and the connections made were truly magical."

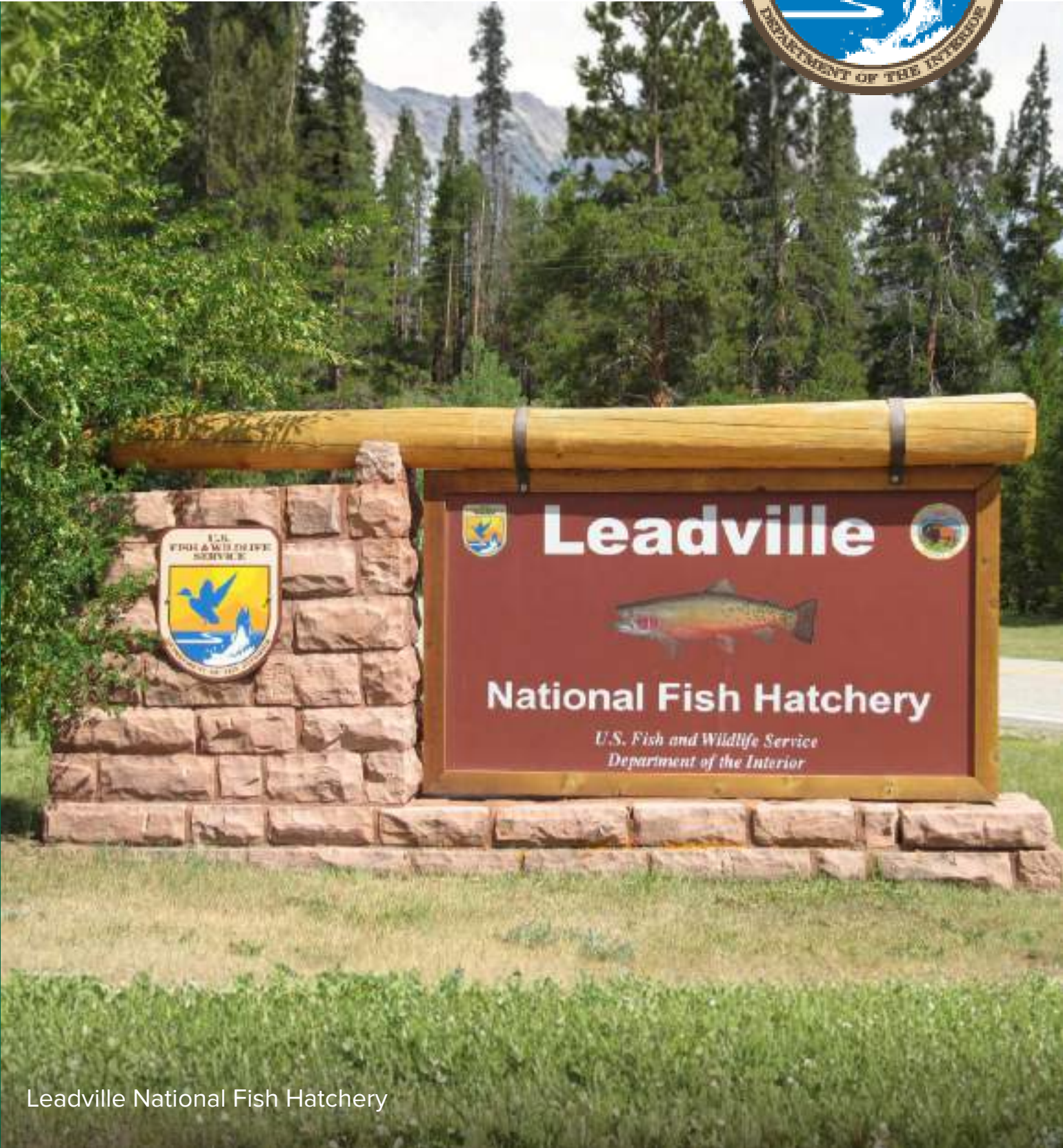
